




Calling all knitters and crocheters!

Help keep preemies in East Africa warm. Tiny hats help save tiny babies.






Goal:

1,117 baby hats by World Prematurity Day 11.17.2017

Each year across the world, 1 million preterm babies die within their first 28 days. Unable to regulate their temperatures, they are vulnerable to hypothermia and ultimately death. Tiny hats are an easy solution; they give tiny babies a fighting chance. UCSF's East Africa Preterm Birth Initiative and the Warm Up America! Foundation are partnering on the **Tiny Hats for Tiny Babies** campaign to deliver your knitted and crocheted hats to newborn health facilities in Kenya, Uganda and Rwanda.

To mark World Prematurity Day on November 17, 2017, help us exceed our goal of 1,117 baby hats!



Make Your Hat

The patterns on the following pages are sized especially for premature babies. Feel free to use any pattern that you like, just be sure that it is sized appropriately. The average preemie in Africa is about 3–4 pounds with a head circumference of 10 in–12.5 in (26–32 cm).

Please use a soft acrylic yarn in pastel or bright colors.

Please prewash the hat in a non-scented or baby-friendly detergent. Tiny babies are sensitive.

Hat sizes

Preemie 3–4 lbs fits head circumference of 8½ in or 21,5 cm.

Preemie 5–6 lbs fits head circumference of 11 in or 28 cm.

Yarn

Caron Simply Soft (6 oz/170.1 g; 315 yds/288 m) Strawberry (0015)

1 ball of yarn will make 15 Preemie 3-4 lbs hats or 12 Preemie 5-6 lbs.

Knitting needles size

US 7 (4.5 mm) or size needed to obtain gauge.

Gauge

20 stitches and 26 rows = 4 in (10 cm) in stocking stitch

Abbreviations

Alt Alternate Beg Begin(ning) Κ Knit K2tog Knit next 2 stitches together Ρ Purl Remain(ing) Rem Rep Repeat RS Right side Stitch(es) St(s)

Instructions

The instructions are written for Preemie 3–4. Preemie 5–6 is written in parentheses. When only one number is given, it applies to both sizes. For ease in working, circle all numbers pertaining to your size.

Cast on 43 (49) stitches (sts)

1st row: [Right Side (RS)]. *Knit 1 (K1). Purl 1 (P1)Repeat (Rep) from * to last st. K1.

2nd row: *P1. K1. Rep from * to last st. P1. Rep last 2 rows (K1. P1) ribbing once more.

Beginning (Beg) on a knit row, work in stocking st until Hat from beg measures approximately 1³/₄ (2¹/₄)" [4.5 (5.5) cm], ending on a purl row.

Shape top: 1st row: (RS). K1. *Knit next 2 sts together (K2tog). K4 (6). Rep from * 6 (5) times more. 36 (43) sts.

2nd and alternate (alt) rows: Purl.

3rd row: K1. *K2tog. K3 (5). Rep from * 6 (5) times more. 29 (37) sts.

5th row: K1. *K2tog. K2 (4). Rep from * 6 (5) times more. 22 (31) sts.

7th row: K1. *K2tog. K1 (3). Rep from * 6 (5) times more. 15 (25) sts.

Sizes 5-6 only

8th row: Purl.

9th row: K1. *K2tog. K 2. Rep from * 5 times more. 19 sts.

10th row: Purl.

11th row: K1. *K2tog. K1. Rep from * 5 times more. 13 sts.

All sizes

Next row: Purl.

Next row: *K2tog. Rep from * to last 1 (1) st(s). K1 (1). 8 (7) sts.

Break yarn, leaving a long end. Draw end tightly through remaining (rem) sts and fasten securely. Sew center back seam. Weave in ends.

Baby's First Cluster Crochet Hat





Hat sizes

Preemie 3–4 lbs fits head circumference of 8½ in or 21.5 cm.

Preemie 5–6 lbs fits head circumference of 11 in or 28 cm.

Yarn

Caron Simply Soft (6 oz/170.1 g; 315 yds/288 m) Soft Pink (39719)

1 ball of yarn will make 12 Preemie 3–4 lbs hats or 10 Preemie 5–6 lbs.

Crochet hook size

US 7 (4.5 mm) crochet hook or size needed to obtain gauge. 1 stitch marker.

Gauge

14 sc and 15 rows = 4" (10 cm).

Instructions

The instructions are written for Preemie 3–4. Preemie 5–6 is written in parentheses. When only one number is given, it applies to both sizes. For ease in working, circle all numbers pertaining to your size.

Beginning (Beg) at crown, chain (ch) 3.

1st round (rnd): 8 half double crochet (hdc) in 3rd ch from hook. Join with slip stitch (sl st) to first hdc.

2nd rnd: Ch 3 [counts as double crochet (dc)]. 1 dc in same space (sp) as last sl st. *Ch 1. 2 dc in next hdc. Repeat (Rep) from * around. Ch 1. Join with sl st to top of ch 3. 8 groups of 2 dc.

Size 3–4 lbs only

3rd rnd: SI st in next sp between 2 dc. [Ch 3 (counts as dc). 1 dc] in same sp. *(2 dc in next ch-1 sp) twice. 2 dc in sp between next 2 dc. Rep from * once more. (2 dc in next ch-1 sp. 2 dc in sp between next 2 dc) 3 times. Join with sl st to top of ch 3. 13 groups of 2 dc.

Size 5–6 lbs only

3rd rnd: SI st in next sp between 2 dc. [Ch 3 (counts as dc). 1 dc] in same sp. 2 dc in next ch-1 sp. *2 dc in next sp between 2 dc. (2 dc in next ch-1 sp) twice. Rep from * twice more. 2 dc in next sp between 2 dc. Join with sl st to top of ch 3. 12 groups of 2 dc.

4th rnd: SI st in next sp between 2 dc. [Ch 3 (counts as dc). 1 dc] in same sp. (2 dc in next sp between 2 groups of 2 dc) twice. *2 dc in next sp between 2 dc. (2 dc in next sp between 2 groups of 2 dc) 3 times. Rep from * twice more. 2 dc in next sp between 2 dc. Join with sl st to top of ch 3. 16 groups of 2 dc.

All sizes

Next rnd: SI st in next sp between 2 groups of 2 dc. [Ch 3 (counts as dc). 1 dc] in same sp. *2 dc in next sp between 2 groups of 2 dc. Rep from * around. Join with sI st to top of ch 3.

Rep last rnd until Hat measures approx. 3½ (4)" [9 (10) cm].

Next rnd: Ch 1. 1 single crochet (sc) in each dc around. Join with sl st to first sc. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

At PTBi-EA our focus is on saving lives. Each year across the world, one million preterm babies die within the first 28 days of life, while over 300,000 women die in childbirth.
